Annual Graduation and Exhibition Reception Celebrates Young Artists

The passion, dedication and achievements of young artists from throughout Southern California were celebrated at our recent June 13, 2006 graduation ceremony. A total of 52 students were honored at the ceremony for completing Ryman's intense training program, plus another 37 were recognized for their participation. The ceremony was held in Exposition Park at the California

African American Museum (CAAM), which graciously welcomed Ryman Arts and our students for the evening's festivities. The evening also marked the opening night of CAAM's exhibition of more than 200 of our students' best works from the 2005–2006 school year. In addition to the thrill of having their best work exhibited in public, being part of the CAAM exhibition's two-month run is a tremendous honor for our students.

Excellence Personified

There are three elements essential to the ongoing success of Ryman Arts and each was personified at the ceremony with three prestigious awards that recognized an outstanding student, high school art teacher and a Ryman Arts faculty member.

"At our core are the students—the next generation of artists and art patrons," says Diane Brigham, Executive Director of *continued on page 2*



Ryman Arts. “Equally vital are the high school art teachers who provide invaluable support to their students and help us in identifying those young artists who have the passion and perseverance to pursue a career in the arts. Completing the circle of success is our extraordinary faculty, which is why we honor one of our own teaching artists in a manner that affords the opportunity to focus on their own professional development.”

It was with these values in mind that the first Lucille Ryman Carroll Student Award of a \$1,000 college scholarship was presented to Kimberly Beswick, who graduated from Quartz Hill High School this year and will be attending the University of California, San Diego for art this fall. The award commemorates Lucille Ryman Carroll, who shared a deep love for the arts with her brother, Herbert D. Ryman. As a way to pay tribute to “Herbie,” she founded Ryman Arts to carry on his conviction that the fundamentals of drawing are essential to becoming a fine artist. The generous contribution of Martin and Leah Sklar initiated the student scholarship, which will be awarded annually to support the pursuit of higher education for an outstanding Ryman Arts and high school

graduate. Future awards will be underwritten each year by a different Ryman Arts board member.

Kimberly was selected from a small group of students who were nominated for the new award, based on their exemplary records of participation and strong bodies of artwork. It was Kimberly who stood out to Juror Penelope Jones, Executive Director of Student Services at USC’s Roski School of Fine Arts, and not just because of Kimberly’s three-hour round trip from Lancaster every Saturday. What impressed Penelope was the breadth of work in Kimberly’s portfolio, along with her “willingness to push herself beyond her comfort zone in unfamiliar media.”

Crucial to each Ryman student’s success is not only the recommendation of a high school art teacher for admission, but also the guidance and inspiration that the teacher provides in the classroom. Doreen Barsky, art teacher and coordinator of the Humanitas Program at Manual Arts High School in Los Angeles, reflects these qualities, which is why she was selected as this year’s recipient of the Herbert D. Ryman Mentor Award. Ryman is still remembered for his dedication to mentoring young artists at Disney and other Hollywood studios where he worked, always insisting that traditional drawing and painting skills are essential tools for success.

Doreen, who has taught at Manual Arts for her entire 30+-year career, displays a deep commitment to her students as a mentor and ardent advocate for art education. She is also a long-time partner of Ryman Arts and facilitates a three-session drawing course at Manual Arts, taught by Ryman faculty member David Schoffman, to help prepare students for the demands of Ryman’s high-caliber classes. And, despite myriad obstacles, Doreen makes it possible for deserving Manual Arts students to apply to Ryman, where four students currently represent the L.A. high school that is just around the corner from our USC Roski School of Fine Arts campus.

Kindred spirits to the mentors at the high school level are the extraordinary master artists who comprise our faculty. This year, with the launch of the Sharon Disney Lund Master Teaching Artist Award [read more on page 4], Ryman Arts had an opportunity to recognize one of our exceptional teachers through a \$2,500 professional development stipend. David Schoffman, a valued member of our faculty since 2003, submitted the winning project proposal to study original masterworks in Rome and Venice in order to “teach drawing in a non-formulaic way that will sharpen students’ powers of observation and sensitize them to the fine points of aesthetics.” Juror Antonia Contra, an artist and executive director of Marwen, an art center providing high quality visual arts education for Chicago youth, applauded David’s proposed course of study as one that will “ignite his teaching with fresh energy and new insights.”

Letter from Diane

Ryman Arts Has Lifelong Impact

Ryman Arts has a big impact on the young artists who participate. This June we graduated 52 artists and the accompanying exhibition at the California African American Museum received much acclaim for the quality of the students’ art. For another perspective, look at the results of some recent studies that explored how Ryman Arts has affected young artists in Southern California:

- In addition to advanced drawing skills, students cited the development of their self-confidence, time management and other “life skills” as positive outcomes of their Ryman Arts experience.
- 93% of respondents in an alumni survey indicated they went on to college after participating in Ryman Arts. Most pursued or are pursuing an arts-related major.
- Almost 40% of alumni respondents indicated that they earn their living in an art related career, and another third indicated that they continue to make art, but not as their primary employment.
- Students have been coming from a larger range of geographic areas and schools over the past 6 years, one indicator that the program is reaching a more diverse population over time. Last year, we served students from nearly 100 zip codes!

Ryman Arts is making a positive difference for talented youth. On their behalf, thank you. You—through your partnership with us as educators, community colleagues, parents, alumni, volunteers, and financial supporters—have made this success possible.

Recently, I returned from an international executive education program for arts leaders at the Stanford Graduate School of Business. (Thank you to the Los Angeles County Arts Commission for nominating and funding my participation.) Designed to strengthen our leadership and to challenge us to think in new ways about the impact of our work, I came home with a deeper realization that Ryman Arts adds substantial value to the community at large, and to the artistic community in particular. We are preparing the next generation of artists and individuals with a lifelong passion for art.

On September 9 we will welcome another group of eager students joining us from over 65 high schools. We need your continued help to sustain the quality program you have helped create, and to meet the increasing demand to reach more highly promising youth. Please consider supporting Ryman Arts now as we prepare for another dynamic year.

Major New Gift to Endow Master Teaching Artist and Award for Professional Development



Teaching essential skills for art and life

Herbert D. Ryman: Artist and Mentor

“By the age of 12, I was seriously interested in art. My mother, who wished her only son to be a doctor, like his father, did not encourage a career in art. Everyone knew artists starved. It was certainly no way to make a living. At nineteen, I was attending Millikin University when I became deathly ill with scarlet fever... I asked my mother, in my delirium, ‘If I get well can I go to the Chicago Institute?’ Mother said, ‘Any place you want to go, just get well.’ The next morning the fever was broken and the first thing I said was, ‘I’m going to the Chicago Art Institute.’”

—Herbert D. Ryman on his art education from *A Brush with Disney: An Artist’s Journey*

With this miraculous recovery, Herbert D. Ryman was free to pursue his real passion: making art. About 20 years later, far from starvation, Ryman finished the first sketches of Disneyland and continued his prolific artistic career with much success.

While Ryman young artists do not need a life-threatening illness to propel their dreams

of higher education, they do need college and career guidance. Whether students pursue professional art school or the liberal arts, Ryman Arts equips them with drawing skills and practical help navigating the complexities of college applications and career exploration.

Ryman Arts honors artist Herbert D. Ryman (1910–1989), who championed traditional art training as the foundation for a successful career in the arts. *A Brush with Disney* celebrates Ryman’s art and life in a full-color compilation that covers not only his 50-year career with Walt Disney and many film studios, but also his own extraordinary artistic journey, including rarely seen artwork and photos such as those shown here. *A Brush with Disney* is available for purchase by calling 213-629-ARTS (2787); all proceeds support the Ryman Arts program.
